

How to Clear Meningitis Hold

Background New York state law prohibits students from enrolling in classes until they have submitted their Meningitis Acknowledgement form online or in person. This requirement is enforced by the placement of a Service Indicator that prevents enrollment.

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| | What is meningococcal disease? Meningococcal disease is a severe bacterial infection of the bloodstream or meninges (a thin lining covering the |
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| | brain and spinal cord). |
| | Who gets meningococcal disease? |
| | Anyone can get meningococcal disease, but it is more common in intrants and children. For some college students, such as freshman living in dormitories, there is an increased risk of meningococcal disease. Between 100 and 125 cases occur on college campuses every year in the United States; between 5 and 15 college students die each year as a result of infection. Other persons at increased risk include household contacts with person known to have had this disease, and people traveling to parts of the world where meningitis is prevalent |
| | How is the germ meningococcus spread? |
| | The meningococcus germ is spread by direct close contact with nose or throat discharges of an infected person. Many people carry this germ in their nose and throat without any signs of illness, while others may develop serious symptoms. |
| | What are the symptoms? |
| | High fever, headache, vomiting, stiff neck and a rash are symptoms of meningococcal disease. Among people who develop meningococcal disease, 10 to 15% die, in spite of treatment with antibiotics. Of those who live, permanent brain damage, hearing loss, kidney failure, loss of arms or legs, or chronic nervous system problem (seizures) can occur. |
| | How soon to the symptoms appear? |
| | The symptoms may appear two to ten days after exposure, but usually within five days. |
| | What is the treatment for meningococcal disease? Antibiotics, such as penicillin G or ceftriaxone, can be used to treat people with meningococcal disease. |
| Ye bad saf Aft with | s, a safe and effective vaccine is available. The vaccine is 85% to 100% effective in preventing four kinds of cteria (serogroups A, C, Y, W-135) that cause about 70% of the disease in the United States. The vaccine is e, with mild and infrequent side effects such as redness and pain at the injection site, lasting up to two days, er vaccination, immunity develops within 7 to 10 days and remains effective for approximately 3 to 5 years. A h any vaccine, vaccination against meningitis may not protect 100% of all susceptible individuals. |
