The deadline for submission is **Monday, October 29th at midnight**; the documents should be sent as PDFs or as plain text in the body of an email sent to BMCCFacultyDevelopmentCommittee@bmcc.cuny.edu.

Applicants will be notified about the final status of their proposals by Friday, November 9th. Participation in this event counts as college service and we would like to see a wide variety of disciplines represented.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Include an online system to reinforce day/time submission rules.
- Have a secondary web site where documents for application are available for downloading. For example Academic Affairs website and Direction of Research Office. Therefore, is one link is malfunctioning, the second is active and available.
- Rubric got better, however, some judges would like additional information of what each score means (something more than Excellent, Fair and Poor). For example, for budget scoring what means a value of 6 or 8. This might be time consuming (for each of the rubric items) but doable.
- Even though 12 proposals are scheduled to be awarded, additional/unused funds can be allocated to fund underrepresented disciplines.
- Large dispersions were observed with some scores, therefore a third reviewer should be added.
- Cover page should include a disclaimer that the same project cannot be submitted anywhere else. This committee found repeats in PSC-CUNY and William Kelly Fellowship (gives RT to tenured faculty). If applying to a second funding program, the proposal should include how different they are.
- To avoid double funding, the release of awards should be early/mid May to confirm that the grant was not awarded by PSC-CUNY or William Kelly. This will also give time to use 3 reviewers.

A report must be submitted by the end of the award cycle, or not later than December of the funding cycle.

The third portion is meant to include presentation at CETLS, which is also a dissemination form.

The last portion of the report gives space to the faculty to explain what went wrong in case there is no publication/exhibition/creative work resulting from the award. If there is product, then that space can be left blank.

These reports should be posted on the Academic Affairs website. Then, future FDG sub-committee can verify that the returning candidates have fulfilled the requirements or not.


Needs for publicity/advertising:

- Created multiple forms of publicity to publicize the Colloquium. Hired a student artist for pay (\$50, not paid yet) to create a design for a poster, which we then used for other publicity.
- o Website set up first Robert contact
- o Email announcement from Assoc Dean of Academic Affairs
- o Large posters for advertisement two weeks before
- o Program for day of event

Food – ordered through MBJ, approved by Ena Jordan and Dean's Office. Can spend \$13.50/person.

Speaker:

- o Invited Speaker –We reviewed youtube presentations by 3 potential speakers and selected Dr. Bettina Love, recommended by Cara Kronen of Teacher Ed.
- o Recommend inviting a big name speaker because we have the funds and not many others on campus do.
- o Must be arranged very far in advance.
- o A lot of email correspondence is required with the speaker or their agent, but Dean's Office very helpful. Maria Castillo takes care of paperwork.
- o Cost \$3000 plus \$750 (limit) for flight. Came in and out on the same day.
- o Must also submit a


