#### H. AGREEMENT FOLLOW-UP PROCEDURES

- 1. Procedures for reviewing, updating, modifying or terminating agreement:
  When either of the degree programs involved in this agreement undergoes a change, the agreement will be reviewed and revised accordingly by representatives from each institution's respective departments, selected by their Chairpersons/Program Directors.
- 2. Procedures for evaluating agreement, i.e., tracking the number of students who transfer under the articulation agreement and their success:

  Each semester, Queens College will provide BMCC with the following information: a) the number of BMCC students who applied to the program; b) the number of BMCC students who were accepted into the program; c) the number of BMCC students who enrolled; and d) the aggregate GPA of these enrolled students.
- Sending and receiving college procedures for publicizing agreement, e.g., college catalogs, transfer advisers, Websites, etc.:
   This articulation agreement will be publicized on the BMCC website, and on the Queens College website. Transfer advisors at BMCC will promote this agreement with eligible students.
- 4. Campus Updates to Transfer Credit Rules:
  Each college will update their transfer rules in CUNY first based on the agreed upon course evaluation, as indicated in this document. When either college makes course revisions to courses included in the agreement, they will notify the other party.

**Effective:** Spring 2022
